21.01	<b>INTRODUCTION – CHAIR MELTON PARISH COUNCIL</b> The Chair of Melton Parish Council, Cllr Alan Porter, warmly welcomed everyone to the annual parish meeting.

21.04	REPORT ON THE WORK OF MELTON PARISH COUNCIL FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2019The Chair gave his Annual Report which is available in full on the Parish Council website at:www.melton-suffolk-pc.gov.ukThe Chair lamented that everyone was not able to meet in person due to the Covid pandemic as it is normally a most enjoyable evening. This was his 7th report as Chair. He began by announcing the winners of the 2021 Melton Annual Award. As it has been such an unusual year it seemed appropriate to give awards to three recipients. The winners were Marie-Therese Ind,

	Emma Needs and Maggie Porter for their commitment to and hard work for the community during the pandemic. Each received a framed certificate and gift voucher.
21.05	<b>OPEN FORUM</b> There was a short open forum for members of the public to raise any issues. Cllr Smith-Lyte asked if the Parish Council had declared an environmental climate emergency. Cllr Porter explained that the Council endeavours to incorporate green elements into the work we do but the Council felt that declaring an emergency was largely ineffectual. Cllr Smith-Lyte also asked if the new Pavilion will have a veranda. It was confirmed that there would be one. Melton Parish Council's Footpath Advocate had walked the re-opened bridleway at Longwood Fields. The ability to have a cycleway/pedestrian crossing at Bredfield Road is difficult as it is too narrow for a refuge and the footpath would need to be widened. It was noted that the end of cycle route/end of cycle route signs here are the wrong way round and the Maintenance Officer would look at resolving this. It was felt that Love Lane could have some additional lighting as it is only partially lit. Cllr James raised the Great British Spring Clean and that he will be looking for support. It will be promoted on the MPC website. Cllr Brown pointed out that he had raised with the office the dangers of Saddlemakers Lane, St Audry's Lane and Lodge Farm Lane whilst Yarmouth Road is closed.

She hopes that the amended processes will help them to respond faster.
21.06.02	<b>Report from Melton Women's Institute</b> In a brief report it was noted that they are very proud to have continued with monthly meetings virtually during the Covid pandemic. Membership has dropped from 57 to 52 but there is still a waiting list of 17. It is an amazing group of ladies and it's lots of fun!
21.06.03	<b>REPORT FROM HEADTEACHER, MELTON PRIMARY SCHOOL</b> In the absence of the Headteacher, his report can be read on the website: <u>https://melton-suffolk-pc.gov.uk/documents/melton-primary-school-annual-parish-report-2021/</u> Cllr Martin highlighted that there will be a nursery opening in September but there was a concern about falling pupil numbers in the area. There have been no Covid cases and the children are enthusiastic to be back at school. The school building improvements are looking good. Thanks was expressed to Cllr James and the Melton Good Neighbour Scheme and the Burness Parish Rooms for helping to organise and distribute food parcels.
21.06.04	<b>Report on Melton Village Fete</b> Cllrs Harvey-Smith and Biggle have contacted participants from previous fetes. They have received some responses and are confident more will trickle

	through. They are going to contact community groups next and wish to widen engagement through sport eg football and tennis. It was noted that a lot of groups are still not meeting regularly due to Covid restrictions. They are also looking at an additional food offer. Several attendees offered to provide contacts for things such as dog agility and the sheepdog that rounds up ducks.
